Advocacy Matters

Arkansas's Kids Count!

In June, we helped release the 2023 KIDS COUNT® Data Book, a 50-state report of recent household data developed by the Annie E. Casey Foundation analyzing how children and families are faring.

Every child and family deserves access to high-quality early childhood care and education. But sadly, this year's findings included bad news for our state: Arkansas parents are struggling more than most to access quality child care.

High-quality child care is a key component of an economy that largely requires both parents to work outside the home while raising children. But in 2020-21, 15% of children birth to age 5 in Arkansas lived in families in which someone quit, changed, or refused a job because of problems with child care.

Arkansas has consistently ranked in the bottom 10 Visit aradvocates.org/2023-kids-count-data-book/ states overall and on specific child well-being indicators, including this year ranking 44th for teens not in school for more information.

15 years of advocacy in Northwest Arkansas

AACF's Springdale office opened in September 2008, to provide a voice for children in Northwest Arkansas. Despite the presence of some of the state's most prosperous cities, Arkansas's 3rd Congressional District has a child poverty rate of 27% (higher than the state rate of 22%).

Our regional office serves the community by researching the needs of children in the area and advocating for solutions to help better the lives of our children and families.

The 2023 Arkansas General Assembly kicked off with the historic inauguration of our state's first female governor, Sarah Huckabee Sanders. From the start, lawmakers were mostly focused on accomplishing her three major policy priorities: education reform, prison expansion, and tax cuts.

The work of child advocates around the state in the 94th General Assembly kept the well-being of children at the forefront of many important debates and helped pass and reshape legislation that will improve the lives of the kids of our state. But there is still work to do, and we look forward to advocating with you.
